I. PEOPLE

A. Physical Distancing. To ensure employees comply with physical distancing requirements, you agree that you will do the following:

- Ensure 6 ft. distance between personnel, unless safety or core function of the work activity requires a shorter distance. Any time personnel are less than 6 ft. apart from one another, personnel must wear acceptable face coverings.
- Tightly confined spaces will be occupied by only one individual at a time, unless all occupants are wearing face coverings. If occupied by more than one person, will keep occupancy under 50% of maximum capacity.

STOP THE SPREAD.

- ✓ Post social distancing markers using tape or signs that denote 6 ft. of spacing in commonly used and other applicable areas on the site (e.g. clock in/out stations, health screening stations)
- Limit in-person gatherings as much as possible and use tele- or video-conferencing whenever possible. Essential in-person gatherings (e.g. meetings) should be held in open, well-ventilated spaces with appropriate social distancing among participants.
- Establish designated areas for pick-ups and deliveries, limiting contact to the extent possible.

List common situations that may not allow for 6 ft. of distance between individuals. What measures will you implement to ensure the safety of your employees in such situations? Six feet distance will be maintained when families come to visit the nursing home. The facility will provide a staff person to be with each resident to assure proper distance. There will be tape on the floor to designate the required distance spacing

How you will manage engagement with customers and visitors on these requirements (as applicable)? They will be provided with all the rules before entering and must agree to follow our safety rules and answer health questions as not to potentiall harm a resident. Additionally regular email updates are sent to families in the event of an update or change to policies or requirements.

How you will manage industry-specific physical social distancing (e.g., shift changes, lunch breaks) (as applicable)?

Staff in the nursing home are required to use PPE in all patient areas at all times. Lunch breaks are accommodated with enough space to allow for 6 feet distance.

II. PLACES

A. Protective Equipment. To ensure employees comply with protective equipment requirements, you agree that you will do the following:

Employers must provide employees with an acceptable face covering at no-cost to the employee and have an adequate supply of coverings in case of replacement.

What quantity of face coverings – and any other PPE – will you need to procure to ensure that you always have a sufficient supply on hand for employees and visitors? How will you procure these supplies?

500 PPE per day. There is enough supply and if necessary, we can secure more.

✓ Face coverings must be cleaned or replaced after use or when damaged or soiled, may not be shared, and should be properly stored or discarded.

What policy will you implement to ensure that PPE is appropriately cleaned, stored, and/or discarded? The facility will provide all PPE to staff who must wear it at all times in patient areas. Any damaged PPE will be replaced. Cleaning, storage and disposal are completed under the supervision of the Director of Environmental Services to assure they store and discard per DOH directive.

Limit the sharing of objects and discourage touching of shared surfaces; or, when in contact with shared objects or frequently touched areas, wear gloves (trade-appropriate or medical); or, sanitize or wash hands before and after contact.

List common objects that are likely to be shared between employees. What measures will you implement to ensure the safety of your employees when using these objects? Universal precautions, PPE, any damaged PPE will be immediately replaced

B. Hygiene and Cleaning. To ensure employees comply with hygiene and cleaning requirements, you agree that you will do the following:

Adhere to hygiene and sanitation requirements from the <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention</u> (CDC) and <u>Department of Health</u> (DOH) and maintain cleaning logs on site that document date, time, and scope of cleaning.

Who will be responsible for maintaining a cleaning log? Where will the log be kept? Director of Environmental Services maintain a cleaning log in his office

Provide and maintain hand hygiene stations for personnel, including handwashing with soap, water, and paper towels, or an alcohol-based hand sanitizer containing 60% or more alcohol for areas where hand washing is not feasible.

Where on the work location will you provide employees with access to the appropriate hand hygiene and/or sanitizing products and how will you promote good hand hygiene? Upon entering the facility or entering each unit there is a station. There is also more hand hygiene stations throughout the unit and in each residents room. Conduct regular cleaning and disinfection at least after every shift, daily, or more frequently as needed, and frequent cleaning and disinfection of shared objects (e.g. tools, machinery) and surfaces, as well as high transit areas, such as restrooms and common areas, must be completed.

What policies will you implement to ensure regular cleaning and disinfection of your worksite and any shared objects or materials, using <u>products</u> identified as effective against COVID-19? The Director of Environmental Services disinfects objects with approved products to reduce infections. There are policies to clean rooms, common areas, and specific for terminal room cleaning.

C. Communication. To ensure the business and its employees comply with communication requirements, you agree that you will do the following:

- Post signage throughout the site to remind personnel to adhere to proper hygiene, social distancing rules, appropriate use of PPE, and cleaning and disinfecting protocols.
- Establish a communication plan for employees, visitors, and customers with a consistent means to provide updated information.
- Maintain a continuous log of every person, including workers and visitors, who may have close contact with other individuals at the work site or area; excluding deliveries that are performed with appropriate PPE or through contactless means; excluding customers, who may be encouraged to provide contact information to be logged but are not mandated to do so.

Which employee(s) will be in charge of maintaining a log of each person that enters the site (excluding customers and deliveries that are performed with appropriate PPE or through contactless means), and where will the log be kept?

The front desk employees will maintain a temperature log on anyone who enter the facility. Evening and nights; the night watchman maintains the log and temperature tests anyone who enters.

If a worker tests positive for COVID-19, employer must immediately notify state and local health departments and cooperate with contact tracing efforts, including notification of potential contacts, such as workers or visitors who had close contact with the individual, while maintaining confidentiality required by state and federal law and regulations.

If a worker tests positive for COVID-19, which employee(s) will be responsible for notifying state and local health departments?

The Infection Control nurse is responsible for notifications.

III. PROCESS

A. Screening. To ensure the business and its employees comply with protective equipment requirements, you agree that you will do the following:

Implement mandatory health screening assessment (e.g. questionnaire, temperature check) before employees begin work each day and for essential visitors, asking about (1) COVID-19 symptoms in past 14 days, (2) positive COVID-19 test in past 14 days, and/or (3) close contact with confirmed or suspected COVID-19 case in past 14 days. Assessment responses must be reviewed every day and such review must be documented.

What type(s) of daily health and screening practices will you implement? Will the screening be done before employee gets to work or on site? Who will be responsible for performing them, and how will those individuals be trained?

Onsite temperature testing, Anyone with a temperature, (as difined by guidelines) will not be allowed to enter the facility

If screening onsite, how much PPE will be required for the responsible parties carrying out the screening practices? How will you supply this PPE? 500 per day. We continue to regularly secure adequate supplies without issue.

B. Contact tracing and disinfection of contaminated areas. To ensure the business and its employees comply with contact tracing and disinfection requirements, you agree that you will do the following:

Have a plan for cleaning, disinfection, and contact tracing in the event of a positive case.

Director of Environmetal Services will be responsible to terminally clean, per our policy, any area that is exposed to

We have working assignments, any staff in contact with a case can be tested, We test all staff weekly per regulation

- Visitors may come into a nursing home for a visit after the facility meets the requirements for the proper number of days since last exposure.
- Any staff or resident that tests positive will force the facility to wait an additional period of time(determined by the DOH) before another visit is allowed.
- Families will be advised via our web site and email updates on the status on visitation.
- We will require a screen for anyone who visits a resident. Questions on their travel, health status, PPE knowledge will all be reviewed with them prior to the visit.
- The facility will have a staff member present at all visits, This staff person will take temperatures of visitors, maintain social distancing and help the family communicate safely as PPE can make communication difficult.
- · Staff will help residents with communication challenges have a safe, worthwhile visit.
- Additionally, the staff can ensure all rules are followed, so that the resident and family stay safe.
- Violations of set rules will result in the immediate termination of visit.
